
## HOW STUDENTS USED HISTORY TO CHANGE THE FUTURE:

THE DUNN - UNTHANK CASE STUDY









DR. CURTIS AUSTIN is an associate professor of history at the University of Oregon. He received his Ph.D. from Mississippi State and came to the UO this fall from the Ohio State University, where he directed the Young Scholars Program and taught Civil Rights Movement history. Before his time at OSU, Dr. Austin taught African American History at the University of Southern Mississippi and was founding director of USM's Center for Black Studies. His publications have received wide acclaim from students, activists, and scholars in the fields of American History and African American Studies.
